Buzzing markets



The Negev covers over half the land of Israel. It consists of six areas: The Blooming Desert, Heritage and Cultures, the Dead Sea Land, Land of Craters and Incense Routes, Arava Valley, and Eilat and the Red Sea. Greener by the year, Israeli initiatives in the Negev have reversed desertification.

UNESCO Heritage Sites

From the Incense Route covering a long trail of incense and spice roads, to the mighty and fabled Masada (in Hebrew: the "fortress"), to Tel Be'er Sheva believed to be the remains of the 10th century BC biblical town Beer Sheva, there's lots of ancient history to explore in the Negev.

At the Negev, you can see animals mentioned in the Bible as well as endangered desert species – from ibex along the Mitzpe Ramon cliff in Sde Boker, to many types of birds. In fact, the north-western part of the Negev is one of the most unique birding zones with a high concentration of under-threat species such as Eastern Imperial Eagle, Saker Falcon, Pallid Harrier and Sociable Plovers, plus Long-lagged Buzzard, Merlin, Peregrine, Lanner and Barbary in winter.

No holiday in Israel is complete without a trip to the Dead Sea. Just a one-hour drive from Jerusalem, this mysterious turquoise lake is in the center of a valley nestled in high cliffs, surrounded by a stunning landscape and jaw-dropping sights.

Combining a desert vacation with a health and wellness experience, against the backdrop of breathtaking natural wonders, the area is a natural miracle that cannot be matched with anything else you have ever witnessed.

The lowest point on Earth

Sitting at -423 meters below sea level, the Dead Sea is the deepest land point in the world.

Multiple health benefits

With an incredible 34% salt concentration and high amounts of other minerals, the Dead Sea delivers a 100% nature-powered spa experience for the skin, body, and soul. Float in its waters and cover your body with mineral-rich mud, like Cleopatra used to as the legend tells.

Ein Gedi – a natural oasis

Located to the West of the Dead Sea, Ein Gedi offers hiking trails, streams, rugged limestone cliffs, waterfalls, archeology and biblical history, botanical gardens, and wildlife. It is home to Nubian ibexes, hyraxes, foxes, hyenas, and leopards on the ground, and hawks, storks, songbirds, quails, and doves in the skies.

Calling all walkers, hikers, adventurers

There are several trails in the Ein Gedi area as well as





in Wadi Arugot which runs along the length of Arugot Stream with many small pools. It also features David Waterfall, a year-round flowing waterfall and the beautiful Dudim Cave.

For serious adventurers, there's rappelling and offroad riding from Arad to Masada – considered one of the most beautiful biking trails in the world.

Two International Airports

Ben Gurion Airport, Israel's main international airport. is located at the heart of the country, off the highway connecting Tel Aviv and Jerusalem. There are taxi services right outside the main gate, a regular bus service, as well as direct or connecting trains between Ben Gurion Airport and the rest of Israel. At the south of Israel is the **Ramon** Airport, the country's second international airport, located 18 km (11 miles) north of Eilat.

Weather

With not many rainy days a year on average, Israel is known for its sunny disposition. Summers are long, lasting from April to October with higher temperature and humidity during July and August. Fall and winter last from November to March. The Dead Sea and the southern city of Eilat enjoy nearly 360 sunny days a year, making them popular destinations yearround. The Red Sea water temperature is comfortable throughout the year.

| The Israeli Week

In Israel, workdays are Sunday through Thursday, and the weekend is Friday and Saturday. On Friday, most businesses are open until early in the afternoon before the onset of the Jewish Sabbath, which begins at sundown and lasts until shortly after nightfall on Saturday.

Driving in Israel

Driving in Israel is allowed from the age of 17 with an international driving license.

Cars drive on the right. Speed limits are 30 to 50km/h in cities, 80-90km/h on freeways, 110-120km/h on highways and Route no. 6. If you're enjoying a night out, keep in mind there is a zerotolerance policy for drinking and driving.

Currency and Exchange

The domestic currency is the Israeli New Shekel. Local and foreign money may be brought into Israel as cash, travelers' checks, and credit cards. Foreign currency of most kinds may be exchanged at the airport, banks, post offices, most hotels and at licensed exchange agencies in the major cities. Cash can easily be withdrawn from the many widespread ATMs via international credit or debit cards.

Languages

Israel's national language is Hebrew and the official languages are Hebrew and Arabic. While English is the main language for foreign communication and is spoken and understood by most, you will also find many people speaking other languages, including Russian, French, Spanish, Amharic and more.
